







Water in Oregon

- By law, "all water within the state from all sources of water supply belongs to the public"
- Water is vital to Oregon's communities, environment, and economy
- The past 100+ years of water management focused on issuing and regulating permits to use water
- Water management is fragmented and uncoordinated

Guiding Framework

"Water is a finite resource with growing demands; water scarcity is a reality in Oregon. Water-related decisions should rest on a thorough analysis of supply, the demand / need for water, the potential for increasing efficiencies and conservation, and alternative ways to meet these demands."

Sustained Bi-Partisan Water Leadership

- Water has historically been underfunded
- Nearly 10 years of investments to implement the Integrated Water Resources Strategy
- 2021 marked the largest investment to-date, but it is just a down payment on what is needed
- 2023 built on past success and maintained momentum on water

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




An Oregon water bill aimed aimed at developing water infrastructure in the Umatilla Basin has made its way through the Joint Ways and Means Budget Committee.

Senate Bill 839 establishes a Water Supply Development account to make loans and grants available for water conservation, reuse and storage projects. The bill would also establish two task forces to review and make recommendations on the structure of the loan and grants, the needs of watersheds for seasonally varying flows and financial feasibility of new water storage projects.

- Funding to update OWRD Water Availability Reporting System and continue work on an Integrated Water Data Portal
- Restored \$1.5 million in water equity funding
- Funding to assess and address vulnerabilities of small and very small community water systems
- Creation of a Drinking Source Water Protection and Aquifer Testing Funds
- Permanent fund for Place-Based Integrated Water Resources Planning
- Instream leasing improvements
- Agricultural Water Management Technical Assistance Program at OSU
- Funding for Irrigation Modernization and other projects


